Dear Mayor Bass,

Since 2017, Investing in Place has been working with Los Angeles City staff, experts in the field, and community partners to make sure that the City's investments in the public right-of-way align with the community's needs and address the substantial challenges of maintaining a city's infrastructure, particularly one of the scale and complexity of Los Angeles. Regrettably, **Los Angeles stands out as one of the only major U.S. cities lacking a comprehensive Capital Infrastructure Plan (CIP)**, and we firmly believe that this status quo can and should be changed.

Through our work, we have developed a series of 9 principles that Los Angeles' CIP must include as it moves forward. Those are outlined in Attachment 1. These ideas support you as Mayor to set a vision and direct staff to reimagine the way more than \$1 billion in public funds are spent each year to enhance LA's sidewalks and streets. Emphasizing a clear vision, fostering collaboration, and increasing transparency – these principles aim to serve the entire city, ensuring that investments are made thoughtfully, strategically, and equitably for a lasting impact.

We engaged with community members and leaders across the city to support this effort. What is clear from these conversations: the City of Los Angeles needs a CIP, and the process must be intentional and inclusive. You'll find more than 80 supporters of this effort listed in Attachment 2.

There is broad support for the City to initiate this effort now, and we look to you to set the citywide vision for how we actualize this goal. Imagine policymakers, City departments and bureaus, community organizations, business leaders, labor and all community members locking arms in a united front to improve the condition of Los Angeles' sidewalks and streets. Your leadership will be instrumental in guiding this collective endeavor. We encourage you to incorporate these principles into an upcoming Executive Directive.

Attachment 1: 9 principles that Los Angeles' CIP must include as it moves forward

Acknowledging the unique characteristics of Los Angeles and the need for a well-crafted Capital Infrastructure Plan (CIP) that aligns with best practices from major cities across the country, I/we support a CIP for the City of Los Angeles that embodies the following 9 essential principles:

#### LA's Capital Infrastructure Plan should:

**1. Articulate a clear vision** that defines a measurable and comprehensive budgeted vision for the future of the City of Los Angeles' public right-of-way infrastructure for the next 5 to 10 years.

**2. Include internal collaboration and coordination** among City departments, agencies, and stakeholders.

**3. Be developed through a transparent and inclusive process that** engages the public, community organizations, and external stakeholders.

**4. Use transparent and data-driven metrics** to allocate resources effectively and equitably, addressing the infrastructure needs of all neighborhoods.

**5. Prioritize and include the maintenance and enhancement of existing infrastructure** to ensure a state of good repair.

**6. Include unfunded needs** to identify and address critical infrastructure gaps for future funding opportunities.

**7. Promote equitable and local hire,** encouraging the recruitment and training of community members to work on infrastructure projects.

8. Integrate measures for emergency preparedness and climate change resilience.

**9.** Be easy for the public to understand and access, ensuring transparency and accountability in the allocation of resources.
